TURKS & EUROPE: FROM THE OTTOMAN EMPIRE TO THE EU

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Officially, Islam plays no role in decisions to accept Turkey as a member of the EU, yet debates frequently focus on whether a "Muslim" country belongs in Europe. Working from this context, this course introduces students to issues of cultural history and identity from the emergence of the Ottoman Empire to Turkey's EU accession process. In addition to providing a general historical survey, reading assignments will alternate from the descriptive to the analytical as they help us examine, interpret, and question assumptions about Ottoman, Turkish and Muslim polities in European contexts. One of our goals will be to decode dominant narratives about "Turks" and to situate scholarly debates about Turks and Europe into interpretive frameworks. Our discussions will focus on recent scholarship that addresses topics such as the "gazi thesis," the "Sultanate of Women," conversion, Sufism, gender, and Euro-Islam.

By examining how different historical narratives not only describe but construct the subjects they describe, we will begin to understand and challenge persistent Orientalist and/or nationalist historiographies. Readings will furthermore introduce students to Ottomans and Turks to help foster a multi-perspectival approach. This will encourage a dynamic, rather than reductive, understanding of Turkish-European relations. Additional readings will address aspects of representation and identity in accounts told from the "outside" and the "inside."

Problems in Ottoman/Turkish studies that have preoccupied scholars will form the basis for student research projects. Examples include the Byzantine-Ottoman transition, conversion in the Balkans, the Ottoman Caliphate, *Pax Ottomanica*, the agency of women, *kanun* and *şeriat*, Ottoman institutions (such as the *devşirme*, *millets*, Capitulations, Sufi orders, etc.), minorities (*zimmi*), the "Ottoman legacy," and EU accession.

Class time will be spent in a combination of discussion and short lecture. Readings, short written responses, and comparative analyses will provide the context for students to select and develop final research projects. By the end of the semester, you will be familiar with important debates concerning Ottoman culture and Turks that continue to leave their mark on Europe and the Middle East today.
