A CITY OF TWO CONTINENTS: ISTANBUL

Istanbul is the only city in the world located in Europe and Asia. In 1923, after sixteen centuries, it lost its status as an imperial capital city (of Roman, Byzantine, and Ottoman empires) and fell into disregard in an era of secular nationalism. Nevertheless, from ancient to modern, Istanbul's cultural legacies have allowed the city to be read as a "palimpsest" – an overwritten, layered text of multiple, even contradictory or concealed, meanings.

In the last decade, Istanbul has reemerged from its peripherialization to reemerge as a global city. As one indication of its changed status, Istanbul was selected as the European Capital of Culture in 2010. As an ancient and modern historical site of the intersection of people, ideas, and cultures, Istanbul is a particularly apt setting to explore tensions of identity, East/West relations, modernity, globalization, Islam, cosmopolitanism and "Turkishness."

This course traces dominant representations of the "city of two continents" in history, literature and film. Through textual and visual analysis, students will examine the major cultural forces (from secularism to Sufism) that define Istanbul's urban spaces. Some of the places we will visit and explore include the *mahalle*, the harem, the historical old city, the street, the Bosphorus, the *gecekondu*, the *pazar*, and new urban spaces. Class-time will be spent interpreting the meanings and functions of these contexts to arrive at deeper understandings of Istanbul's traditions and its modernity and postmodernity.

We will be examining modern and contemporary texts that have a direct or indirect historical component. As we do so, certain characters, scenes, and contexts will obsessively re-appear in ways that allude to larger cultural narratives. Supplemental readings and discussion topics will focus on nationalism, orientalism, gender, representation, globalization, and literary/cultural theory.

Class sessions will focus on student participation and discussion. By the end of the semester, students will have gained the interpretive tools to make important interventions in debates concerning urban politics and city culture that continue to leave their mark on Europe and the Middle East.

This course counts toward the Turkish minor and the Duke Islamic Studies Certificate as well as to majors and minors in SES, ICS, and AMES. It is recommended for students participating in Duke in Istanbul and Duke in Turkey study abroad programs.

Course Requirements and Grading:

- 1. Regular attendance; absences will lower your grade
- 2. Discussion leading reports: Summarize main points or analyze scenes (10%)
- 3. 1-2 page interpretive reading exercises based on various prompts (10%)
- 4. 5-page Istanbul culture report: Place, person, concept, itinerary, or object (15%)
- 5. Two essay tests (30%)
- 6. PowerPoint presentation focusing on final paper project (5%)
- 7. 10-page final paper of historical or cultural analysis (20%)
- 8. Annotated EndNote bibliography of 10 outside sources (10%)
